## **School Curriculum**

Late last week, <u>legislators decided</u> that there was no path forward for <u>SB 167</u>, <u>"Education Matters."</u> This great success could be in part due to the <u>national attention</u> it received in response to Senator Scott Baldwin's remarks that teachers should remain impartial on Nazism.

The debate continues, however, with <a href="HB 1134">HB 1134</a>, "Education Matters," a very similar bill that would also put unnecessary burdens onto teachers to post their full curriculum online for committee review, restrict or eliminate critical lessons on racism and history of marginalized people in the US. On Wednesday, MCCOY joined other education advocates and participated in a <a href="press conference organized by the Indiana State">press conference organized by the Indiana State</a> Teacher's Association to oppose HB1134.

The bill has passed the House Education Committee and we expect it to go to the full House chamber for a vote on Monday.

## **Youth Justice**

MCCOY joins our colleagues in the Indiana Coalition for Youth Justice to support <a href="HB1359">HB1359</a>, "Juvenile Justice Matters"</a> which passed out of the House Committee on Courts and Criminal Code earlier this week with bipartisan support. If passed, this bill would establish a minimum age of 12 for juvenile detention. Currently, IN doesn't have a minimum age standard and children as young as seven and eight can be held in detention facilities. We also support <u>SB 340</u>, <u>"Juvenile Law Matters,"</u> which is still sitting in the Senate Corrections and Criminal Law Committee. Next week is the last week to get bills heard in committees and SB 340 is not scheduled for a hearing yet. If passed, this important legislation will protect children who interact with the justice system. ## **SNAP Benefits**

On Thursday afternoon, legislators in the House committee on Family Children and Human Affairs heard testimony on <a href="HB1354">HB1354</a>, "Requirements for SNAP Participants." If passed into law, this bill would erect costly and complex barriers that would cut vital food assistance for Hoosier families. SNAP and the Child Support program form an important lifeline for low-income children, which is why the state should ensure that changes to these programs help families-- not hurt them.

The bill is still in the committee. <u>Contact committee members today</u> and tell them that you want to ensure no food assistance will be cut for Hoosier children. Ask them to oppose HB1354.





This upcoming Monday, <u>HB1041</u>, <u>"Participation in School Sports,"</u> will receive a hearing in the House Committee on Education. If passed, this bill would prohibit students assigned male at birth from participating in a girls' sport. Trans students participate in sports for the same reasons other young people do: to challenge themselves, improve fitness, and be a part of a team. Excluding trans students from participation deprives them of opportunities available to their peers and sends the message that they are not worthy of a full life.

MCCOY opposes this bill and will join other advocates to defend trans youth. School should be a place that provides belonging and academic opportunity for everyone-including transgender children.
